HOST PROFILE BROOKE THOMAS PRODUCER / MEDIA MARKETING



Brooke began her screen career over 18 years ago working in production advertising before landing a role as the Production Coordinator/ Manager for *Postcards WA: Series 8 & 9.* She then worked on *Can We Help? Series 1* working closely alongside the Executive Producers to create the show from concept to completion. It was the first ABC co-production filmed in the Perth studios.

Brooke worked as the State WA Marketing Manager for GWN7 (Prime TV) for four years where she also had the opportunity to write and direct the children's TV Show *The Saturday Club*. In 2014 she worked as the Production Coordinator/ Assistant in the short documentary series *One and Only* for ABC2.

More recently Brooke has been successful in receiving a placement in the *Production Manager Accelerator Program* through *Screenwest*, and an opportunity to work with a mentor through *WIFT Mentor Her Program*.

FILM GUEST PROFILE JUB CLERC WRITER / DIRECTOR



Jub Clerc is a Nyul Nyul/ Yawuru woman whose descendants reach as far into the Bardi and Juru tribes of the Kimberley regions of W.A.

At the impressionable age of 14, Jub went on a National tour with the first Aboriginal musical *Bran Nue Dae*, written and performed by members of her family, which sent her down the path of the creative sector. The fourth Aboriginal person to graduate from W.A.A.P.A in 1997, Jub acted in many state theatre productions before moving to film and TV, working on *The Circuit 1 & 2, Bran Nue Dae film, Mad Bastards, Satellite Boy, Jandamarra's* War, *Jasper Jones and Mystery RD- Season 1*.

Jub has directed over 15 micro-docs for IC S, a grounds root initiative to help Indigenous communities record their stories. She has written and/or directed short films and mini docs, *Storytime*, *Music Men*, Min Min Light, Molly & Cara and *Abbreviation* from the feature anthology - *The Turning*. For NITV, Jub reported for entertainment show, 'Around the Traps' and hosted kids' series, 'Mugu Kids' often alongside her mum and daughter.

Since 2010 Jub has seasonally performed as a Soprano in the world's first Aboriginal Opera, 'Pecan Summer' and has performed at the Karijini Experience 'Opera in the Gorge'.

Jub wrote her first play 'The Fever and the Fret' which world premiered at Yirra Yaakin Theatre Co, and won the prestigious 2017 'Kate Challis Award'.

In 2019 Jub directed two episodes on her first TV series 'The Heights' - Season 2.

Jub is set to direct her first feature film with Arenamedia in 2020/21, which she co-wrote.





A Walkley Award winning photojournalist and NIKON Ambassador, David Dare Parker has photographed for many national and international magazines throughout Asia, the Middle East, Europe and Australasia. Publications include LeMonde, Stern, L'Express, Focus, Australian Geographic, The Bulletin, The New York Times, Fortune and Time Australia.



David Dare Parker continued

During 2004 he was appointed journalist in residence at Murdoch University and lectured on photography at Central TAFE in Perth, Western Australia. He has also worked extensively in film, television and the performing arts. He has run photography workshops for Head On Photo Festival, FORM, Country Arts WA and Nikon Australia.

He is featured in the Australian War Memorial book 'Contact' – Australian War Photographers and WAR: Degree South. Projects include coverage of East Timor's struggle to gain independence and Indonesia's first steps towards democracy. In January 2002 he was asked to co-ordinate a safety awareness course for Afghan Journalists in Peshawar, Pakistan for the International Federation of Journalists. During April and May of 2003 he was the Official War Photographer for the Australian War Memorial during Operation Falconer in the Middle East, the first time an Official Photographer had been assigned by the AWM since the Korean War. Recent work includes coverage of the Rohingya humanitarian crisis in Bangladesh.

As a film industry production stills photographer, credits include 3 Acts of Murder, Cloudstreet, Underbelly Razor, Brothers In Arms – Bikie Wars, Redfern Now, An Accidental Soldier, Love Child 2, Red Dog: True Blue, Paper Planes, Jasper Jones, Three Summers, Breath, Whiteley, Dirt Music, H is for Happiness, Go! & Mystery Road Series Two. He is one of the original co-founders of Reportage, was a Director of FotoFreo Photographic Festival and a Walkley Advisory Board Member. He is a member of the °SOUTH Photo Co-operative and the SMPSP: The Society of Motion Picture Stills Photographers.
